Celebratory Spotlights

Celebrating the life and legacy of Judith "Judy" Heumann, Disability Rights Activist. On March 4, 2023, our community lost Judy Heumann, a pioneer in the disability rights movement who left a legacy for future generations. Heumann is considered the mother of the disability rights movement for her lifelong lobbying for legislation that eventually led to the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, and the Rehabilitation Act.

During the 1970s, Heumann won a lawsuit against the New York Board of Education and became the first teacher in the state who could work while using a wheelchair, which the Board had tried to claim was a fire hazard. From 1993 to 2001, she served as the Assistant Secretary of the U.S. Office of Special Education and Rehabilitation Services in the Clinton administration. Subsequent missions included spreading ideas about civil rights across the world to foreign countries. Between 2000 and 2015, a total of 181 countries passed disability civil rights modeled after the ADA.

In 2020, Heumann was featured in the documentary "Crip Camp: A Disability Revolution," which highlighted Camp Jened, a summer camp Heumann attended that helped spark the disability rights movement. The film was nominated for an Academy Award. This civil rights hero who changed the lives of millions also served as one of our panelists in October 2022, when our DEI Committee, under the leadership of Maria Spera, LCSW, hosted a viewing of "Crip Camp: A Disability Revolution."
