Look professional

- Please dress professionally as if you are in the clinical setting
- Must wear student ID
- White lab coat are recommended
- No jeans, athletic workout clothes, sweat or yoga pants, tee or belly shirts
- Clean, neat non-wrinkled scrubs are acceptable but should wear white coat if wearing scrubs
- Be careful with use of overpowering perfume or cologne
- If you arrive dressed unprofessionally to the CSC, you may not be allowed to complete your activity

Bring your stethoscope if you will be examining the patient

SIMULATED PATIENTS (SP's)





Simulated Patient:

- Individuals trained to act as real patients to simulate a set of symptoms or problems used for healthcare education, evaluation, and research. This is performed in a standardized, repeatable way
- SPs will not break character.
- Learners should not break character.

• This will begin your encounter timer



ENCOUNTER TIMING

Encounter Time:

- The time allotted for interaction in the room with the patient.
- You will receive a warning prior to the end of the encounter and then a final warning when the encounter is complete

Post Encounter Time:

• The time allotted for a post encounter activity if included (patient note, self evaluation, etc)

PPE REQUIREMENTS & HANDWASHING

The CSC follows Stony Brook Medicine's mask policy

• Currently it is optional to wear a mask, not required

Must wash/sanitize hands on entry and exit of room

Hands may be washed with soap and water or use the hand sanitizer which is located on the wall immediately <u>inside</u> the exam room

If physical exam is required, hands must be sanitized again prior to start of physical exam

- Can wear gloves during physical exam if desired (not required)
- Gloves are located in all sizes by the sink













COMMUNICATION 1

Beginning the Encounter

- Introduce yourself
- Explain your role/title
- Address the patient by name
- Demonstrate a professional demeanor and appear professional
 - \circ Friendly and personable
 - Appropriate for the patient and situation

COMMUNICATION 2

During the Encounter

- Show interest in the patient as a person.
 - <u>Non-Verbal</u>: Body language, eye contact, nodding
 - <u>Verbal</u>: Use statement of empathy, understanding, or support of the patient's feelings and perspective.
 - $_{\odot}\,$ Be genuine, caring, concerned, and respectful
- Collect information in an organized fashion.
 - $_{\odot}\,$ Start with open-ended questions, clarify with closed-ended questions
 - Clear and articulate

COMMUNICATION 3

Ending the Encounter

- Summarize or repeat information to the patient.
- Inform the patient of the DDx in an understandable way.
 - $_{\odot}\,$ Give more than one Dx "I suspect it may be.....but I also want to rule out....."
- Tell the patient your plan and assess their willingness to carry it out.
- Ask the patient if they have questions or concerns.



PHYSICAL EXAM 1



If a physical exam is required, the patient will have on a patient gown

- They will have on underwear and females will additionally have a bra on
- Do not ask the patient to remove underwear or bra
- Can ask to remove socks if you need to examine the feet

For full credit, perform all exam maneuvers:

- Completely as you were taught
 - **Example** auscultating the heart, must listen to all 4 areas or listening to carotids must ask patient to hold their breath
- Perform on skin (not over the gown)

PHYSICAL EXAM 2

All needed physical exam equipment is in the room

- We encourage you to bring your stethoscope with you.
- Reflex Hammers, Tuning forks, Blood Pressure Cuff, Cotton balls, etc.
 - Located in the bins on the wall at the head of the exam table
- A Visual Chart
 - Located on the back of the exam room door.

Vital signs may be provided on the door note – you can recheck the vital signs if you think it is clinically relevant, however in any discussions with the patient, you need to use the provided vital signs

PHYSICAL EXAM 3

Consider the patient comfort and extend leg extension on table if available

Always drape patient appropriately, exposing only the area to be examine.

- A Sheet is available in the exam room
- Located on the chair by the sink

Tell the patient what you are doing (Describe the Physical Exam)

• For example, "I am going to listen to your lungs now, please breathe deeply though your mouth".

Tell the patient what you have found during your exam

• For example, "Your lungs sound normal to me".



PHYSICAL EXAM RESTRICTIONS



No corneal reflex, genital, pelvic, breast or rectal exams will be performed.

If you felt any of these are indicated, you would ask for it at the end of your PE and results will be provided if indicated.

If your SP is wearing a mask you can ask them to lower the mask to examine any area under the mask



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STOP PHRASE



"Stop Phrase"

- Used to ensure SP safety
- SPs are here to help you learn, but we want to make sure they are not harmed in any way

If needed, the word "Stop" will be used by the SP:

- "Stop, that hurts"
- "Stop, I'm not comfortable with that."
 - Used in the rare instance when a learner inadvertently causes true physical pain to the SP or attempts to perform a restricted invasive physical examination
 - Not be confused with the character being portrayed or "case related" statements: "Yes, that's where the pain is or that's where it hurts."

The SP must clearly use the word "Stop".

Simply stop what you are doing, reassess what you are doing and then continue with your encounter
