In fact, we provide the most advanced pediatric emergency care available in Suffolk County. As the county's only Pediatric and Adult Level 1 (highest) level Trauma Center, we have a team of highly skilled specialists on standby 24/7 ready to take care of the most severe traumas and emergencies.

Expertise: Led by nationally recognized pediatric emergency specialist Sergey Kunkov, MD, MS, MBA, our team is composed of board-certified pediatric emergency physicians and pediatric intensivists who have devoted their life's work to emergency care. They not only have the experience of working with the most extreme emergencies, they also are skilled in the latest protocols, techniques and literature on emergency medicine. In addition, they work closely with other pediatric subspecialists to ensure your child is correctly diagnosed and treated appropriately the first time — key when every second counts.



Child-focused: Our dedicated separate entrance keeps children away from potentially frightening adult crises that can occur in a general emergency department. We also offer child-friendly décor, nine private treatment rooms that can accommodate up to two family members plus your child, a waiting room stocked with toys, and two negative pressure isolation rooms for evaluating children with potentially infectious airborne diseases.

Speed: Our goal is to get your child seen and treated as quickly as possible. We address cases on a triage basis, which means the order in which patients are seen depends on the severity of the injury or illness.



Continuity of Care: Once your child has been stabilized, if he or she is still in critical condition, we can transfer him or her to our Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU), which provides highly sophisticated care by fellowship-trained physicians and a team of critical care specialists, along with high-tech **support and 24/7 monitoring.**

Convenience: Free valet parking lets us take care of your car so you can take care of your child.

A Hallmark of our ED: Ouchless Medicine

"If we are the ones inflicting pain, we need to do something proactively to minimize it." — Sergey Kunkov, MD, Director, Pediatric Emergency Department, as quoted in The Wall Street Journal.

For us, ouchless medicine means focusing on the least invasive procedures and ordering tests only when they are necessary for diagnosis. If your child requires any type of procedure involving needles — blood draw, IV insertion, needle stick — we apply numbing cream first. We also bundle as many tests together as we can so your child does not have to undergo repeat procedures, such as multiple blood draws.

In addition, Child Life Services professionals are on hand to explain procedures in kid-friendly, age-appropriate terms, relieve anxiety and provide distraction.

If your child needs an invasive test or intervention, we use a safe and short-acting anesthetic so he or she feels no pain and awakens with no memory of the procedure. And while we know that "ouchless" medicine is best for your child, we've also found that it is good for parents as well.
